Paper 1 (9ELO/01): Voices in Speech and Writing (40% of total marks)

Paper 2 (9ELO/02): Varieties in Language and Literature - drama text (40% of total marks)

Coursework: Investigating and creating texts (20% of total marks)

What does Paper 1 entail?

The title of this exam paper is, 'Voices in Speech and Writing.' Paper 1 is divided into two sections; A and B. The exam will last for 2 hours and 30 minutes.

Section A examines your comparison skills. You will be required to analyse the language, context, audience and purpose of two texts; one from your anthology, the other unseen. There are 25 marks available for this section. You will **not** be allowed to take your copy of the anthology into the exam. This is known as a 'closed book' exam.

Exemplar question:

Read Text B on page 5 and Text C on pages 6-7 of the source booklet.

Compare how the speakers shape their language to create a sense of voice.

You must compare:

- the use of linguistic and literary features
- the influence of audience and purpose
- the context of the texts

(25 marks)

Section B examines your knowledge and understanding of one drama text. You will answer **one** extract-based essay question on the chosen text. There are 25 marks available for this section. You will be allowed to take a copy of your drama text into the exam.

Exemplar question:

All My Sons, Arthur Miller

Read the extract on pages 7–8 of the source booklet.

Using this extract as a starting point, and with reference to other parts of the play, discuss how Miller develops the characters' dilemma with the morality of the business world.

In your answer, you must consider Miller's use of linguistic and literary features and

relevant contextual factors.

(25 marks)

What does Paper 2 entail?

The title of this exam paper is, 'Varieties in Language and Literature'. Paper 2 is divided into two sections; A and B. The exam will last for 2 hours and 30 minutes. This is an 'open book' exam.

Section A examines your analysis of an unseen prose non-fiction extract on a given theme. There are 20 marks available for this section.

Exemplar question:

Theme: Society and the Individual

Read Text A on pages 3-4 of the source booklet.

Critically evaluate how the writer conveys his response to this event. In your answer, you must comment on linguistic and literary features and relevant contextual factors.

(20 marks)

Section B examines your ability to compare one prose fiction anchor text with another text from a given theme. There are 30 marks available for this section.

Exemplar question:

Evaluate the effectiveness of the methods used by the writers of your **two** studied texts to present how deception shapes attitudes to love and/or loss.

In your response you must consider the use of linguistic and literary features, connections across texts and relevant contextual factors.
