THE AMBASSADORS' MEETINGS

In preparation for Bewdley's Global Happiness event a number of Bewdley students, including two Sixth Form students, met the ambassador from Jordan at the Jordanian Embassy in central London.

During the interview we learnt a lot about: the history of Jordan, its ancient culture, modern tourist attractions such as the desert, dead sea and capital city (Amman), fun facts including that the Dead Sea is eight times more salty than normal sea water. Also the latest Star Wars film was filmed in the Jordanian desert as it looked most like the planet Mars compared to any other place on Earth.

We asked "What qualities do you think you need to be a good diplomat?" and "How did you get to the position you are now as ambassador?" "Recently I have read a news article about various strikes and protests within Jordan, In particular 100,000 teachers are on strike for better working conditions causing 1.4 million students to be locked out of their classrooms. InterAct students including Sixth Formers Harry Hughes and Harry Garstang, visited the Ugandan Embassy. The day was an amazing experience where students learnt a lot about Uganda. Students asked lots of question and were inspired by the High Commissioner Julius Peter Moto who describes Uganda as "beautiful, welcoming, compassionate, opportunistic and forward thinking".

Kate Oakley, CEO of Planting for Hope, came and joined students at Uganda House and spoke about her work and what the school in Kittiti was like before she started the charity work. She then spoke about how amazing it is now, with their playground, partly built library (of which Interact funded the building and the books), the medical centre, football pitch, clean water, the fence around the school.

Students also had gifts to share with the The High Commissioner from The Bewdley School, Bewdley Rotary Club and The Bewdley Civic Society.



"I was given the opportunity to visit three embassies in London. The trips helped me to explore and broaden my knowledge about the cultures, traditions and history of various countries including Jordan, Palestine and Uganda. Meeting the ambassadors assisted me in the interest of a career in diplomacy, I acquired knowledge of the various skills desired to be a diplomat. Furthermore, I was able to obtain information and discuss things about these countries in order to participate in the Global Happiness Conference where I received the opportunity to meet new people and explore different cultures."

STAR'S IN BRAZIL

These first three and a half months have been the best and most challenging months of my life! I have experienced and grown so much already and I'm excited what the rest of the year is going to bring for me.

I've visited many tourist spots in São Paulo such as Liberdade (a Japanese-style part of the city which is just incredible with amazing sushi) and Paulista which is incredible (especially when they close the road on Sundays and you can get your Instagram pictures).

However, even though the tourist spots are a dream and I'm so excited to visit more, being an exchange student and living with Brazilian citizens is like having an all-access pass to Disneyland. It is the best and also most life-changing experience as you get to see Brazil through the eyes of her inhabitants.

There are five questions that I get asked all too often from people here in Brazil, other exchange students and my friends and family back home so I'll answer them now:



1: Can you speak Portuguese?

Yes, I can! It's incredible being able to converse and understand what people are talking about! For the first couple of months, it was rough going for a while, conversing in broken Portuguese and not understanding an awful lot. It was a time when google translate was my best friend haha. Now I understanding everything anyone says to me and I can respond in Portuguese too, although I am still learning and verb conjugations are kicking my butt!

I had a dream in both Portuguese and English once and it was the strangest thing, I ended up waking myself up, my brain was that confused!

When I'm talking to somebody in England, I think in English and when I'm talking to Brazilians, I think in Portuguese which is crazy as I always wondered how that even worked.

It's easy to think in Portuguese now because I'm not thinking about what I say in English and constantly translating in my head, which was how it was in the beginning and it was extremely tiring, I simply just say what I want to say because I know the vocabulary and verbs (sort of).



2: Do you like the food and have you put on weight?

The food here is extremely different to food in England however it is wonderful (I do find myself missing good old beans on toast moment when I'm not really in the mood to cook though)

They have a lot of choices here in Brazil and the variety of fruits they have here puts us to shame. I find it difficult to say what my favourite food is here, I know that I adore Acaí here though and I'm going to be sad to leave it behind.

I have put on about 2kgs since I've been here which isn't as much as I expected but I have been going to the gym. I know some people that have put on a lot more though so it depends how active you are and your body type/metabolism. I was nervous about putting on weight but it's just a thing that's bound to happen because you are experiencing a total lifestyle change!



3: What's the biggest culture shock that you've experienced?

When I first arrived in Brazil with 24 hours of travel on me, I was welcomed so warmly by so many people and it was overwhelming! I hugged everybody individually, introducing myself etc... but it was a little bit more awkward than just hugging because as I went in for the hug they went in for the kiss on the cheek and by the time I'd realised that is how they greet people here...I'd already awkwardly hugged/chin bashed everybody...so we love that for me.

That is not nearly the biggest culture shock I've experienced here though. The most surprising thing I've seen in Brazil so far is how normalised it is to everybody with the poverty and favela issue they have here. It's incredibly astounding how someone extremely rich can live next to someone who doesn't even have a door, and how suburbs here means favelas all stacked on top of each other...it's truly heartbreaking to see little children sat on top of their houses watching cars drive by on the motorway.

Favelas that are closer to the city are one thing, but a village I visited in my first month of being here was truly heart-wrenching. They are so cast-out by the world that they don't speak Portuguese, they speak a language that is only used by them and therefore we are unable to properly communicate. This means that they can't even travel to the city to work because they are so cut off verbally. They live their entire lives in their little village where groups and organisations such as the Rotary work to deliver food, clothes and entertainment for them.



4: Are you homesick?

Getting this close to Christmas I'd say I'm more homesick than usual, but I'm such a sensitive person normally so it's hard to tell with me.

I do miss my family and friends an awful lot but I wouldn't even consider returning to England yet, there's just too much I've yet to see! The people here are so nice and I have so many new friends it's hard to decide which is worse, building a life for 16 years and leaving it for 11 months, or building a life for 11 months and leaving it forever.

I'm looking forward to Christmas of course (it's my favourite holiday) but it's a little scary and sad to be sharing it with different people.



5: Do you like your host family?

I love my host family! They are the best, better than I could've ever asked for!

I remember when I was sat on the plane (in absolute agony physically but that's a story for another day) counting down the hours until I had to land and live a life in Brazil I wasn't sure I wanted to live anymore, being alone for so long gave me a lot of time to talk myself out of the entire exchange and consider just catching a connecting flight back to England, but as soon as I met my family, my mind was instantly changed.

They are so loving and caring and have shown me so many cities and features of Brazil that no tourist would ever know about! I've been to loads of different cities and the beaches here are the best (especially when they don't involve bundling up in hats, scarves and gloves to go and face the biting winds of Whitby or other beachtowns!)

I have travelled for 10 hours before now to visit a different state of Brazil and let me tell you that those ten hours changed everything about the way the inhabitants speak there! It was so hard for me to understand what they were saying, which was so frustrating as I thought I was beginning to get a handle on this whole Portuguese thing!

I have three host families during my year here, all of whom I've met and all of whom are amazing and kind (I got so lucky!). I change families after I get back from my one month, Northeast trip in February (had to drop that in somehow) and again in May (where I visit the Amazon rainforest so stay tuned for the blogs) and I'm so excited to experience how different families live life here in Brazil.

- Study at a Brazilian private school, Visit Minas Gerais, See and swim in waterfalls (check the Instagram @star.aurora)
- Visit Maringá, Paraná
- Learn how to samba (sort of)
- Learn how to dance to funk (again..sort of)
- Gone to barbecues (so different to how we do it in England) Made amazing friends from all over the world
- Attended a Catholic mass
- Gone to Holambra flower festival,
- Joined a guitar class and have finally gained confidence in performing my music Ridden the metro alone,
- Gone to the beach
- Gone to a pool party (they get a bouncy castle with a built-in football court, make it a slip and slide and play football which is the best invention ever in my opinion),
- And so much more!!!

she completely immerses me in it



Her world consists of elements that echo the ancient cavemen or native Indian times and that of magic (which is always a bonus). For me she truly is a nostalgic writer


covers religion, conflict, and the survival




Shakespeare has had a significant influence on my career path

Birmingham Town Hall Live Conference





On 13 November A Level Biology students attended the A Level Science Live conference at Birmingham Town Hall to listen to 5 top Biologists who are working at the cutting edge of their specialisms. Dr Jenny Rohn from University College London, talked about the fascinating and terrifying world of bacteria and the famous Professor Robert Winston talked about how he got to where he is now. They also had a talk from Professor Gina Rippon from Aston University, who gave an extremely interesting talk looking at the brain and gender and Professor Steve Jones, from University College London, explained what Darwin's revolutionary idea and modern genetics reveal about homo sapiens. Students particularly enjoyed Dr Giles Leo from the University of Cambridge who explained his research into obesity and the influence of our genes in our feeding behaviour. During the day, students also had 2 sessions on exam technique from a specialist Biology Examiner.







Year 12 students along with 40 Year 10 students from The Bewdley School, attended the Worlds Skill Show at the NEC. Students got the opportunity to discuss career options and the many pathways available to them.

This was a thoroughly worthwhile day trip as I gained really valuable information on admissions to Oxford and their interview process.

Dear Colleague

During the course of the last six months the school has established 'The Discovery Society' with the charitable purpose of:

"To advance the education of the students at The Bewdley School by providing and assisting in the provision of facilities [not required to be provided by the local education authority] for understanding of and engagement in exploration and scientific research."

In practice this encompasses our adventurous curriculum, including Duke of Edinburgh Award, and a range of opportunities to engage in scientific research, including the Crest Awards and a range of school based competitions and activities.

As a part of this programme we wish to instigate a programme of regular scientific lectures at school. Ideally these would be weekly, but we understand that practicalities may make this challenging in the first instance. We would expect talks to be during the evening and last around an hour, though there would obviously be significant flexibility with this.

It is our hope that we will be able to invite speakers who are engaged in research in Higher Education institutions or their partners, to come into school to speak to our older students and staff about their research. There are also opportunities for remote presentations using video conferencing technologies, where geography is a barrier.

I am writing to you in the hope that you might be able to support us in this venture. As a new charity, whilst we may be able to raise funds to cover travel costs, it is unlikely that we will be able to pay professional fees in the first instance. We are therefore reliant on the generosity of speakers and their willingness to share ideas with a new audience.

Operation Wallacea

Expedition to Dominica



Operation Wallacea Dominica July 2021

The expedition is open primarily to pupils that are studying Biology or Geography but any students who have a particular interest in wildlife, ecology and conservation may apply also for a place on this 2-week trip.

Dominica is the most unspoilt island of the Caribbean. Its steep forested cliffs rise straight out of the sea and the deep forest canyons with huge waterfalls make mechanical clearance impossible on the island. In the first week, the group will be based at a rainforest research centre in the tropical forest and will assist with various surveys, such as bird surveys, forest structure, herpetofauna surveys (including documenting the spread of an invasive anolis lizard), freshwater ecological surveys, bat surveys and invertebrate surveys. During this week they will also complete a course on Caribbean Island Ecology. For the second week the group will be based in Fort Shirley on the north part of the island and will either learn to dive to PADI Open Water level or will complete a Caribbean reef ecology course either by diving (if a qualified diver) or snorkelling.

In order to secure your place on this amazing 2 week expedition, please note the following:

- Current Year 13 students can go as part of the group, but they will need to be DBS checked and they must follow school expectations, as they will have left one year before
- The trip costs are substantial: Expedition cost (fixed): £1275 Travel and additional costs (estimate): £1392 Estimated total cost: £2677 (equivalent to a £150 deposit and £130 per month)
- It is hoped that we will raise at least £1000 per student (with their support) with a target of £1275 per student to cover the expedition costs.

This September saw the launch of the first professional pathway at The Bewdley School. Sixth Form students can now enrol on the Professional Pathway for Medicine or careers within the medical sector. This will not only give them a whole range of experiences such as medical masterclasses, taster sessions and work experience but will also help them stand out when applying for UCAS or alternative post 18 opportunities.

The medical pathway started in September with a 2-day Introduction to Medicine course for Year 12 students delivered by Doctors at the Bewdley Medical Centre. Students listened to a selection of presentations on a range of topics including orthopaedics, palliative care, ophthalmology alongside participating in small group work activities looking at ethical decision and GP scenarios. The students thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience and we are now working with the Medical Centre to arrange work experience placements for the students.

Mr Barry - Senior lecturer Ophthalmology led on being an Ophthalmology Consultant and Dr Wenham (from York House Surgery) finished with communication skills. Students and teaching staff would like to formally thank all professionals for their time and preparation for these events. You have been a key aspect of inspiring our next generation of medics.

"The range of presentations that were organised for this event have cleared any uncertainty I had before about becoming a doctor and helped me decide upon the field I intend to specialise in. All the professionals, over both weekends, offered useful advice about entry requirements, admissions and interviews (for example about ethics which I didn't know was an important part of the interview process before). Also, it was really good to hear what their daily work actually entails from professionals who know first-hand."

HOW TO APPLY

Admission to our Sixth Form is outlined in our Admissions Policy which is updated each year.

Students will select three subjects that they will study over a two-year linear course with all formal examinations taken at the end of Year 13. We have generic minimum entry requirements that all students must meet, and additional requirements for each individual subject they wish to study.

Entry Requirements:

1.Meet the entry requirements for each of three chosen subjects 2.Gain at least a grade 4 in 2 or more other subjects (including Maths or English Language) 3.Show excellent attendance, motivation and attitude.

Specific Requirements are listed in the Sixth Form Prospectus.

Students achieving a level four in English and Maths will be entered for the qualification as part of their Sixth Form curriculum.

This will consist of 4 or 5 one year GCSE courses, based around resit English and Maths, often an issue for those missing the Level 3 entry requirements, and 3 other GCSE courses. These might be, for example, GCSE Sociology, BTEC Applied Science and Cambridge National Creative iMedia. The course will be bespoke and shaped around those who apply.
