These experiences will become crucial and aid students' knowledge when trying to access a particularly competitive market. We also believe that this will inform students' post-18 decisions and allow them to make the right choices for them.

Scholar's Programme


This year we have added a new addition to our super and extra-curricular range, the Scholar's Programme. This takes place after-school and covers a range of topics which helps students become ready for the challenges of post-18 study as well as provide valuable information for competitive university courses and apprenticeships. We have already covered 'What Extra's are Universities Looking For? 'Competitive Apprenticeships', and advanced study skills, covering critical thinking and essential research skills. We will also be guiding students through debating, presenting research and interview practice. These sessions are open to any and all students and we look forward to starting these sessions again this year.



At Bewdley Sixth Form my new Year 12 cohort now have a full term tucked away under their academic belt. It certainly needs releasing a notch, or 4, as they have piled their obligatory study times and own time full of the latest extra and super-curricular opportunities. Our 'Scholar's' programme is supporting everyone add the Xfactor to their post-18 choices. Subject extension opportunities continue to fill our weekly Friday PowerPoint; exploring free courses from MOOC, day and evening Q&A lectures from universities across the world (Canada - Southampton). Our medical pathway continues to thrive with in person sessions twice a term, and a range of weekly work experience or super-curricular events led on Teams. We have hosted numerous speakers from a range of disciplines; the army, classics, civil engineering, physics, academic writing, studying at university, Oxbridge, Russell Group and Operation Wallacea.

Young Enterprise continues to meet every Wednesday lunch time for all our business and/or creative minded students. Duke of Edinburgh Gold is now underway with a few Year 12s popping back to their old stomping ground -Bewdley Primary school – to volunteer. Students have also volunteered at our on-site careers events helping the smooth running for our external visitors and there are more opportunities opening when our Youth Centre opens.

As I type this I wait with baited breath to see what tomorrow's end of term fancy dress day brings and who will be awarded 1st, 2nd and 3rd place!



How does studying in Year 12 differ from Year 11?

It is difficult to generalise about study skills, and you will need to work with your mentor and teachers to find your most effective approach to study. However, the section begins with tips that everyone can follow!

- Get yourself organised keep your purple planner or online diary up to date, listing work set, work completed and work outstanding.
- Try and stick to a regular work rota: do a little bit of study often, rather than leaving huge amounts of work to the eleventh hour before a deadline. Late work is invariably rushed, often incomplete, and of inferior quality, and by starting an assignment well in advance of a deadline you will get the chance to ask staff for help if you need it. Most 'A' level students need to work for a



minimum of between 14 and 16 hours per week OUTSIDE of lessons. A good rule of thumb is to assume that for every taught lesson you receive, you should be completing another hour's worth of work outside of that lesson.

- Work in our study room, not somewhere where you will be distracted. At home, work somewhere where you will not be disturbed (and where you can leave books and folders safely). If you do need to work on a computer, make sure you are not signed into any social networking sites (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram etc) to avoid distractions.
- Don't be afraid to ask for help during your OS's or 'frees' when you need it. Don't suffer in silence and don't pretend you understand something when you don't.
- Use all the available resources: teachers, textbooks, libraries, periodicals, the Internet, newspapers, television and radio, fellow students – especially your peers and Yr 13s.
- Motivate yourself. Form a subject study group. Create your own goal to aim for ... a favourite TV programme in half an hour after some academic work; a university grade or apprenticeship offer.
- Work in attention span units. Few students can work effectively for more than one hour before their concentration starts to ebb (this is particularly so with revision). Divide your working time up into attention span units (40-60 minutes) punctuated by short breaks.
- The more you put in, the more you get out, both in terms of results and enjoyment.

Bewdley Sixth Form we will be undertaking studies in a wide variety of subjects including Computer Science, Neuroscience, Mechanical Engineering and Law. The afternoon saw the students have an opportunity to record their sound effects using state-of-the-art equipment to capture their ideas. Overall, the students enjoyed the experience, and a huge thank you to the University of Worcester for giving up their time and equipment to help the Digital Media students with their studies.

Since September in Digital Media single award, we have been working on advertising media, specifically producing a campaign for a coffee brand, which includes designing and making a print and tv advert.

Quite recently, we took a trip to University of Worcester, where for the whole day, we had access to high-end camera equipment to experiment with first hand; along with access to their recording studio where we could use Foley sound to create audio effects to implement into our adverts. Over the next few weeks, we will be editing this footage and implementing effects and audio into the advert in attempt to produce a well-rounded campaign!

Using photo editing software like Affinity Photo, we have designed our own social media banners and print adverts which represent our coffee brands – this has been really fun as it's an entirely creative process with the possibility to make it look exactly like you want it to!

Choosing Digital Media is a great opportunity to further your skills that will really help when wanting to pursue a career in the creative media industry! It allows you to feel more confident when designing, and you also get to experience working with a brief like you would in the real

The overall scheme of the project is like the BTech IMedia available at GCSE where Unit 4 Interactive Media Product follows the creation of Website/ Kiosk Screen for an area of your choice following the brief provided by the exam board. For the other units that has been chosen for the Double of Digital Media are: Unit 6 -Social Media and Globalisation; Unit 8 - Photography for Digital Media Production; Unit 15 - Create Audio-Visual Promos; Unit 19 - UK Broadcasting; and Unit 21 – Plan and Pitch.

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In February, Year 12 and 13 A level Biology students had a fantastic presentation from Dr Emma Yhnell, who is a Lecturer at Cardiff University in the School of Biosciences. She spoke about her background research into Huntington's disease, genetic testing and what it's like to be a Scientist. Students then had plenty of opportunity to ask questions.



In October, Year 13 Biology students enjoyed two days of field studies work at the Bishop's Wood Centre. The first day was spent looking at the topic of succession. Students explored how ecosystems are maintained and how they dynamically change over time under the influence of abiotic and biotic factors and collected data on a range of factors. They then spent the second day looking at the topic of Energy and Ecosystems where students carried out pond dipping to determine the distribution and abundance of organisms in two different ponds. It was a great way to consolidate what they have recently been learning in the classroom.







TIME MANAGEMENT SEMINAR

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A Time Management seminar with Year 12 students were introduced to a range of strategies that will help support their revision and help to manage all the pressures on their time, while still finding time to study effectively.

ORDERRRRRRRRR Year 12 Politics visit to the Houses of Parliament





Who gets an armrest in the House of Peers? Why are MPs entitled to snuff? What is the distance between the two front benches in the House of Commons? Well... the 26 Bishops, or the 'Lords' Spiritual' are the only members to receive armrests; in 1694 smoking was banned in the Commons, so it is tradition that the Principal Doorkeeper keeps the complimentary 'snuff box' filled, and the distance between the two front benches is said to be 13 feet, equivalent to two sword lengths.

On Wednesday 8th December, these questions, along with hundreds more were answered, as we (Year 12 Politics students) were transported to Westminster for a virtual tour of 'the Mother of parliaments', The Palace of Westminster (Houses of Parliament).



Our tour started in the oldest part of the estate, Westminster Hall. This is the only part of the original palace that remains. It has survived several fires, and damage from the Blitz during World War II. The hall was originally used for showing off. Royal Banquets were held often in the Hall. Today the Hall is used to interview MPs, showcase art and to make speeches, such as Obama's 2011 speech to parliament. Our guide took us from the Hall through the entrance lobby. Showing us the route a Member of Parliament would take to work every day. Areas otherwise closed to the public, such as the MPs post boxes were most interesting. Our guide took us inside the Commons Chamber, Lords Chamber, the Members Lobby and the Voting Lobby (which are real rooms! One for MPs voting in favour, aye lobby, and one for voting against, nay lobby). There is so much more to Parliament than what we see on TV. There must be hundreds of rooms and corridors with more secrets and surprises the tour didn't have time to show us. It is easy to forget that Parliament isn't just the two chambers, but a functioning Royal Palace.

Our guide was fantastic. A knowledgeable, charismatic gentleman who was just as interested in Parliament and politics as we were. We were provided with a question box, to ask him anything about Parliament... there was nothing he couldn't answer. After a term of studying the politics of the country, it was great to learn more about the buildings where the politics took place. The experience was very informative, conventions and traditions in the UK are both strange and fascinating. We were given a wide range of facts and stories, from the tradition to check the cellar below parliament for gunpowder and how all pieces of law are written on vellum (lamb skin) and stored in the Parliamentary archives. The tour has made me want to visit parliament in person once we are allowed to again.

Jack Muller: The Earth is Singing....

Weeks ago, I took a step back in time to the second World War in Latvia and read the story of Hanna Michelson in 'The Earth is Singing' where she lives as a (teenage) Jew when the Nazis came to Latvia. 

Emily Jones: 'Skipping Christmas' by John Grisham....



Ivy Perrett-Conroy: 'To Kill A Mocking Bird' by Harper Lee...

'To Kill A Mocking Bird' is an insightful and complex novel by Harper Lee with central themes of racial injustice, sexual assault and the reproduction of social values. The characters in the book are divided by race, class, opinion, sex and age and the breaking of these boundaries is shown through the Finch family. When a black man is accused of the rape of a



white woman, Atticus Finch is assigned as his defence lawyer and it brings to the forefront the violent hatred aimed at the black people in town by the white people. Lee urges her readers to reflect on the prominence of racism in the southern states of the US and shows the human capacity for change, empathy and understanding. Atticus' young daughter Scout narrates the book and acts as a breath of fresh air to contrast with the views held by many in her town. This youthful innocence and compassion are Lee's way of exhibiting the potential for wider acceptance of differences and the much-needed evolution in social values.

Rebecca Johnson: 'A Street Cat Named Bob' by James Bowen



William Murdoch: 'War and Peace My Story' by Ricky Hatton



This is what Owen Mason, Year 13 had to say about the event:


"On Wednesday we heard from 5 Motivational speakers, fronted by Mr Rhino (Dave). Dave talked about making assumptions about people and how negative it can be and to illustrate this we learnt about '2 truths and a lie'. We were encouraged to imagine our goals and to consider: why you want to do it, looking into top achievers, having a plan, saying yes to opportunities, commit to it, making it fun and having a good attitude.

He then spoke about knowing Jon Brooks before he went on to find fame as drummer for 'The Charlatans' . Dave knew him as a teenager, who didn't know what he'd do in future.

We then crossed over to runner up of The Apprentice 2008, Claire Young. She spoke about failing in front of over 11 million people, but it was one of the best things in her life as her business came out of that. 13 years on, she is the successful founder of 'School Speakers'; an organisation that works with schools, colleges, and universities to provide speakers to come in. Ben Dyer followed this. He established a business with his cousin Mike who had connections with Claire Young and Dragon's Den's Peter Jones. They set up a collective business venture that Lord Sugar invested in. They had a 'can and will do' attitude, which benefitted them. Now they work with over 300,000 children in the national Enterprise Challenge. They are very proud of where they come from, being two people who grew up on a council estate in Stoke and now run a very successful business.

We then heard from Sue Evans who shared some great techniques to deal with stress and how to feel awesome! Lastly, we heard from SUMO (Shut up and Move on) writer Paul McGee. He was very upbeat and positive. He talked about the frustrations of WHSmith not stocking his book and how he overcame this annoyance.

THE RE-OPENING OF THE YOUTH CENTRE



The Will Mills Centre The William Mills Foundation



Following four years of negotiation with Worcestershire County Council and a year negotiating funding with the National Lottery 'Reaching Communities' team, we are delighted to announce that youth provision will again be offered in Bewdley. Bewdley Youth Centre, which is attached to Bewdley Leisure Centre, was built in the early 1990s, but sadly closed its doors due to government funding cuts in 2012. Whilst Bewdley Youth Café in the town centre filled the void left behind for a number of years, it also had to close three years ago due to funding pressures.

The re-opening of the Youth Centre is a joint project between The William Mills Foundation and The Bewdley School. Thanks to National Lottery funding, it is currently being refurbished with a view to opening its doors as 'The Will Mills Centre' during the coming weeks. The core activity of the centre will be 'The Youth Hub', run on weekday evenings by Katy Thorne, our new Youth Centre Manager. The William Mills Foundation will be offering its 'Future Steps Programme' to children from Wyre Forest schools in the afternoons. This highly innovative bespoke programme has been running with students from The Bewdley School over the last two years, and the opening of the centre will enable the Foundation to open this offer out to other schools in the area.

The Will Mills Centre will also act as a multi-agency hub during the school day, with access available for a range of services to support young people, including health care, social care and community policing. Once established, it is also intended to offer hire of the facilities at weekends to members of the Bewdley community, for clubs and other activities. We are very excited by this development, which reflects the school's ambition to be at the heart of its community. Please watch our social media for further updates in the coming weeks and months.

CRIMOLOGY

Why choose to study Criminology?

Do you always watch, read or listen to true crime? Do you wonder why an individual may turn to crime? Have you ever wondered...is someone just 'evil'? Are you interested in how we punish and help offenders? If you have asked yourself these questions, then you should study Criminology!

Entry Requirements

Minimum of 5 GCSEs at grade 4 or above grade 5 in English.

What will I study?

This has 4 units and is modular in structure which means you will be assessed at the end of each unit.

Unit 1 (Changing Awareness of Crime) and 3 (Crime Scene to Courtroom) are internally assessed coursework and unit 2 (Criminological theories) and 4 (Crime and Punishment) are externally examined. Subjects such as media representation of crime, how to process crime scenes, psychological theories explaining criminality are just some of the topics covered in this course!

What skills will I develop?

Critical thinking- you will always question everything and never just assume anything. This will then translate into your writing as you develop your written and verbal expression.

Personal skills such as organisation and independence will grow during the study of criminology.

Opportunities

During your studies here, you will meet professionals and academics that will widen your criminological understanding.

Level 3 diploma is graded A*-E which is equivalent to an A Level and carries the same UCAS points as other A Levels. Progression to university is the most common next step with courses such as policing, law, sociology, criminology, forensic science, psychology etc. Many careers are open after studying criminology at A-level and/or university.




